Steps to Opening a New Business in the City of Washington

Starting a new business can be an exciting experience, but before you can open the doors and get started, there are several approvals and permits that are required. This guide will provide you with a checklist of the offices within the city that need to be consulted before you can open your business. Information has been provided regarding parking, landscaping, signage, as well as building code requirements and utilities. The name and phone number of a person within each department has also been provided, allowing for a point of contact at every level of approval.

Well before you are ready to open the doors to your new business, there are steps that you can take to make sure your plans will be successful. The Small Business Center that is located at Beaufort Community College is a resource that can help writing a business plan, how to market your business and the financial aspects of starting a business. They are also available to help established business owners as they continue to grow. While these aren't required steps, they are strongly encouraged they will aid in providing a thorough understanding of what to expect when starting a business, identify strengths and weaknesses in your business strategy, and help to ensure a successful outcome when you do open your business.

Additionally provided is a list of organizations within the city to help promote new business, as well as websites that can provide additional information beyond what is offered here.

CHECKLIST

General:

___ Create a business plan

For any business, the first step is to turn your basic idea into a written, viable plan of action. A well-thought out business plan is necessary for obtaining loans and is a model for your success. Refer to the Business Planning and Resource Section on website:

___ Identify sources of financing

____ Decide on your business structure and register your business name

- Careful consideration must be given to the management, structural and tax implications of your decision. While not a replacement for sound legal or tax advice, see <u>Selecting a Business Structure</u> and the <u>Business Forms</u> on website: <u>blnc.gov/start-your-business/planning-checklist</u>.
 - To register a business name for a sole proprietorship or general partnership: Contact the County Register of Deeds Office where you intend to do business.
 - To file a Corporation, LLC, LLP, or Limited Partnership: Contact the North Carolina
 Secretary of State, <u>Corporations Division</u> or call (919) 807-2225.

___ Get State, Federal and County license requirements

The State of North Carolina does not issue a single business license. Your business may be subject to state, city, county and/or federal requirements. Call Business Link NC at (800) 228-8443 or (919) 807-4280 to determine your state license needs. Business Licenses & Permits listed by State Agency and/or Licensing/Occupational Board are available on website: blnc.gov/start-your-business/planning-checklist or you may contact the North Carolina Business Service Center at 919-715-2864.

___ Obtain the necessary tax information

Taxation for small businesses may be simple or complex, depending on the size and business structure. The tax liability for each business will be different and you should consult your attorney and accountant regarding comprehensive tax planning. See the Business Tax

Learn about employer reporting requirements and responsibilities

___ City Planning Office Contact: Glenn Moore (Planning Administrator): 252-975-9317

- How is the building zoned?
 - If the building will need to be rezoned or usage changed (from residential to commercial, etc.) there is an application/approval process that must be completed
 - Complete the application
 - o Submit the application to the Planning Board
 - o Planning Board makes recommendation to City Council
 - City Council votes on rezoning
 - o Pay \$125 fee
- ➤ Is the building in a flood plain? If so, a variance will have to be applied for and approved prior to any construction.
- Submit Site Plan
 - Are there any parking and landscape requirements? This should be covered in the site plan submission
- Sign Permit
 - o There are requirements regarding the size and number of signs that are allowed
 - An application must be filled out and approved prior to installation of signs
- ➤ Historic District
 - Depending on the project planned, work may need to be approved by the Historic
 Preservation Commission. Check with the planning office for more information.

____ City Building Inspectors Office Contact: Wayne Harrell (Chief Building Inspector): 252-975-9304

- Change of Use Application
 - Depending on the use of the building, you may need to apply for a change of use. An
 example is changing a clothing store to a restaurant
- Building Inspection
 - Prior to opening, the building must be inspected to ensure that all building codes are met
- Building Permit

Any changes that are made to the interior or exterior of the building require a permit.
 All permits must be submitted through the building inspector's office

____ Restaurant/Bar Contact: Stacey Harris, RS (Health Inspector): 252-946-6048

- A restaurant or bar requires an inspection prior to opening.
- If you are obtaining an ABC permit, you may also be required to have the police inspect the restaurant/bar
 - You should also contact the North Carolina Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission for an application (919-779-0700)

Public Utilities Contact: Customer Service: 252-975-9300

- The utilities on the building must be put into your company name.
- An inspection of the building may be required prior to the transfer
 - o Dependent on how long the building has been vacant
 - Fees is \$51 plus a deposit
 - List of Information needed to establish new service: www.washingtonnc.gov/arranging-for-service

____ Fire Inspection Contact: Mark Yates (252) 948-9401

- > Ensures that the building meets all fire codes
- Must be done by the Fire Marshall
- Fees are determined on a case by case basis
